Our Expected Outcomes

1 Prayer-Saturated Congregation

- speaking to God on behalf of a lost world
- praying first, acting second
- interceding for individuals, rulers and nations to yield to the ultimate victory of Christ
- listening to the Holy Spirit and obeying Him

2 Worshipping Congregation

- celebrating the saving grace of God in singing
- encountering God in prayers
- reading and obeying the Word
- preaching the Word
- observing the sacraments

3 Discipling Congregation

- connecting all who wish to know Christ to groups or cells
- nurturing believers toward Christ-like, obedient love
- enfolding believers, welcoming them into membership
- bringing disciples to a life pattern of holy living through the transforming work of the Holy Spirit
- taking and sending disciples into the world to serve

4 Evangelizing Congregation

- befriending spiritually lost people
- presenting and explaining the gospel in culturally relevant ways
- inviting spiritually lost people to trust Christ as Savior

- establishing cells as core groups for new church plants
- planting new congregations

Multiplying Effective *Learning Communities*

Learning Communities focus on five objectives:

1. Grow in Christlikeness
2. Unite around a vision
3. Learn in teams as peers in Christ
4. Share stories which influence godly behavior
5. Understand and manage cultural forces which shape the church

Learning Communities organize themselves into teams or groups that meet regularly, using a model such as the acrostic L.E.A.D. to guide their agenda:

L Learn together through studying and discussing the Bible and books or articles that contribute to the understanding of God's Word.

"So...throw yourself into this work of Christ. Pass on what you heard from me...to reliable leaders who are competent to teach others."
(2 Timothy 2:2)

E Encourage one another by listening to one another's story, offering counsel, praying for and spurring one another to love and good deeds.

"If you've gotten anything at all out of following Christ, if his love has made any difference in your life, if being in a community of the Spirit means anything to you, if you have a heart, if you care – then do me a favor: Agree with each other, love each other, be deep-spirited friends." (Philippians 2:1-2)

A Accountability means that we will live according to the principle that speaking the truth and extending grace to one another over the course of time produces godly fruit in and through the church.

“If someone falls into sin, forgivingly restore him, saving your critical comments for yourself. You might be needing forgiveness before the day’s out. Stoop down and reach out to those who are oppressed. Share their burdens, and so complete Christ’s law.” (Galatians 6:1-2)

D Dream together about ministry and Christlike living. Do. Put into practice those ministries and behaviors that intentionally obey the commission of Jesus.

“God authorized and commanded me to commission you: Go out and train everyone you meet, far and near, in this way of life, marking them by baptism in the threefold name: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Then instruct them in the practice of all I have commanded you. I’ll be with you as you do this, day after day, right up to the end of the age.” (Matthew 28:18-20)

Our Strategic Priority

To multiply godly, competent leaders.

The focus of the Bishops, Superintendents and all general church ministry teams must be one these three functions:

- Invest in the multiplication of godly, competent leaders who mentor and equip others
- Form and nurture effective Free Methodist Networks that enhance the fulfillment of our Expected Outcomes
- Promote the vision path that every church be a healthy church with Spirit-filled leadership, working a plan to fulfill our Expected Outcomes





Our Community Culture

- We are a **connectional** church. We are strengthened most by our relationships based on truthfulness and grace.
- We believe our **mission drives everything** we do.
- We **proclaim a grace that is free**. Jesus said the crowning work of authentic ministry is this: when the poor have the gospel brought to them. Hence, the destitute and disenfranchised of the world deserve our particular care.
- We strive to make the message of the **gospel relevant** to our culture by remaining faithful to God, while showing love and sensitivity to the world.
- We **accept all** who come to us, seeing the most desperate sinner with the potential to become a whole and devoted follower of Jesus.
- We see smaller **groups and cells** within the larger Body of Christ as the best environment for the birth, mentoring, encouragement and care of new believers.

- We view our local ***churches as mission outposts***. Our pastors are appointed, not just to a local congregation and building, but to the evangelization of whole communities, towns or cities.
- We see ourselves as an ***apostolic movement***. We are a “sent” people, charged with the task of reaching new territories and new populations of people with the gospel.
- We are ***Wesleyan*** in our doctrine and in our practice. We value the guidance of the scriptures and the consensus of the Church throughout her history.
- We are to be a ***holy people***. Our conduct and our teaching are to reflect the holiness and love of God. We seek nothing less than the healing of mind, body and soul of all who come under our care.

FM Networks

Networks are teams of people with a specific mission, working in close consultation to advance the cause of Christ. They ...

- Shall be **formed out of need**, upon the availability of a godly, competent leader.
- Shall be **supported** only as they function in **harmony with the Great Commandment** and the **Great Commission**.
- Shall **continue** as they **provide leadership**, which results in fulfilling our purpose and mission and as they **evidence multiplication** of disciples, leaders, groups and churches.
- Shall **select apprentices** to be mentored by Network leaders so that multiplication will occur intentionally and regularly.
- Shall **function within the funding parameters** provided through United Ministries for Christ (UMC) Home Ministries, though the network may propose to the FMCNA Board of Administration additional means through which they may generate income.
- Shall submit an **annual report to the Board of Bishops** by July 1, noting:
 - Goals and objectives
 - Progress on meeting goals and objectives
 - Financial report including a projected budget for the coming year
 - Rationale and need for the ongoing function of the network





Empowerment Plan

Step 1.

Share information
with everyone

Connection is vital, thus Free Methodist Communications is moving to electronic communications. Denominational web sites are linked to one master site: www.freemethodistchurch.org.

- Build trust through sharing.
- Practice mutual accountabilities.

Step 2.

Create autonomy through
healthy boundaries

Our non-negotiables define our FM boundaries. When people know the boundaries and are empowered through trust and training, their passion for Kingdom realities grows.

Therefore, we propose that leaders at every level:

- Clarify goals and roles.
- Define values that underlie actions.
- Create permission-giving procedures.

Step 3.

Function in ministry
through self-directed teams

Networks expand the Kingdom when they empower godly, competent leaders by being flexible, multiplying and need-meeting.

Therefore, we propose that leaders at every level:

- Utilize spiritual gifts and temperaments.
- Provide direction and skills training.
- Release control to the effective teams.

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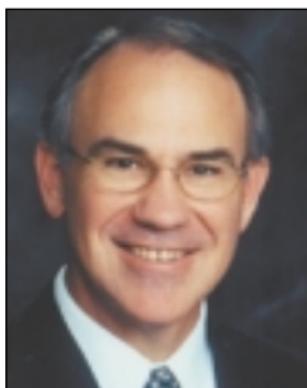
